CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE MONSIGNOR PERRY KAVOOKJIAN

Dear Brother Knights and Friends:

It's usually thought that men don't demonstrate their faith or religiosity in a public way. Women seem much more comfortable expressing their faith. Just look at who's involved in our Catholic parishes. The great majority of volunteers and those who participate in spiritual activities are women. Yet, I think our parish comes pretty close to shattering that generalization. Our Knights of Columbus are one example of how men can get involved in their faith and live it out through good works. I might also boast of our Men's Bible Study which has been meeting for about 10 years. Many are members of the Knights but not all. I think our parish is pretty healthy when it comes to the numbers of men who are actively involved as volunteers and who attend Mass faithfully.

The real test (in my opinion) of a man's willingness to "exercise" his faith happens at our annual Men's Retreat. We shouldn't be too surprised by those men who are a little fearful of attending a retreat with other men. Many have preconceived notions of a "retreat" where those in attendance might be asked to speak publicly or pray aloud. No worries! Our Men's Retreat is a friendly and positive spiritual experience balancing spiritual learning and fellowship. I can give you the names of several men in our parish who might have been reluctant to participate in the retreat and who have found it to be the highlight of their spiritual lives each year.

Fr Jim Nisbet has been the facilitator for several years now. He is a down-to-earth, insightful priest who knows how to speak the language of faith in a non-intimidating way. I am not aware of any man who has attended the retreat who didn't have some kind of positive experience.

The Men's Retreat is scheduled for the weekend of January 23-25, 2026. Do your spiritual life a favor and seriously consider attending. You won't regret it.

We welcome all three to 14754! This brings our total number of members to 205. Our quota for the current fraternal year is 12 new members--we have added eight thus far. Dues collections are also off to a great start for the fraternal year. Thus far we've collected dues from 49 members. Total money taken in is \$2352 in regular dues and \$2388 in optional dues. ON INJUN SUMMER JIM PATTEN, PGK

Here is the famous "Injun Summer" cartoon by cartoonist John McCutcheon. The Chicago Tribune originally printed it on September 30, 1907, along with the 450-word description that McCutcheon wrote to accompany it. It was so popular that the Tribune reran it between 1912 and 1992 when wokeness caught up with it. I still have fond

memories of it because I was probably about the size and age of the boy depicted in the cartoon (circa 1948) when my dad sat me down and read the Injun Summer story to me and, more importantly to my dad, told me all about the great art involved in Injun Summer. You see, my dad was a commercial artist himself, and Norman Rockwell was his idol, but he respected the art work anyone who was even close to Rockwell and McCutcheon was one of them. It is an easy online search to find all the complete Injun Summer text and information about John McCutcheon who was born in 1870 and died in 1949. My dad was born in 1911 and died in 1980, and Norman Rockwell was born in 1894 and died in 1978, so McCutcheon, my dad, and Rockwell were all contemporaries. Here is a part of the old man's narrative to the boy for the transition from the top cartoon to the bottom



cartoon. "See off yonder; see them tepees? They kind o' look like corn shocks from here, but thoem's Injun tents, sure as you're a foot tall."

The Tribune always printed its reruns of Injun Summer in October, because in the Midwest that is the month of Indian Summer. For me as a kid the Tribune reprints of "Injun Summer" was the kick start of the holiday season. When I moved from Chicago to Bakersfield in 1982, I soon discovered that here Indian Summer runs between October and December in Bakersfield, so this article will be timely for our council newsletter in any of those months.

I hope that this little article will inspire more members to share some of their own personal stories in our council newsletter.

RETREAT PROGRAM

Father Jim Nisbet will again lead our 2026 Men's Retreat at the St. Anthony's Retreat Center; located on twenty-five acres at the foothills of the Sierra Nevada Mountains near Sequoia National Park. St. Anthony's Retreat Center provides a comfortable, peaceful, and a naturally beautiful setting. The retreat center's accommodations are dorm style rooms with private bathrooms. Meals are included and will be served in the center's dining room at scheduled times.

RETREAT SCHEDULE

The program begins Friday at 5:30PM with Mass, followed by dinner.

- The first, one hour, session begins at 7:30PM, followed by hospitality and fellowship.
- Saturday begins with an optional mass followed by a hearty breakfast
 - o Second and Third sessions before lunch, and Fourth session following lunch.
 - This year Monsignor Perry will join Father Jim for a session as they share their experiences in "listening to God.
 - o An enlightening outdoor Stations of the Cross, led by Father Jim Nisbet, is an optional Saturday afternoon activity.
 - The evening is yours to enjoy, but optional events include, a relevant movie, hospitality, fellowship, and sharing, or individual reflection.
 - Opportunities for the Sacrament of Reconciliation may be available throughout the day.
- Sunday morning begins with mass, breakfast and the fifth and final session. The retreat concludes with lunch at 12PM.

COST AND REGISTRATION

The cost of the retreat is \$370 for a shared room; cost includes meals for the entire weekend. Full payment is due by January 15th. Scholarship opportunities are available for those needing financial assistance. Transportation is not included, but we can help arrange carpools as needed.
